





The legendary hospitality of the Sri Lankans help make an overseas visitor feel immediately at home.








So the small friend went ahead but could not fight the bear. He shouted for help but the big friend climbed a nearby tree and said : "I am up on this tree, come and climb it quickly."




The big friend came down from the tree and asked : "Friend, what did that bear tell you so secretly?" The small friend replied : "The bear advised me not to believe a false friend like you".


Thereafter, they parted and went on different ways.



























































































